New Zealand. Navin held the position of Programme Teaching and Training Manager for molecular diagnostic platforms and PPTC centre-based courses. He was also EQA coordinator for the COVID / molecular EQA programme as well as being a PPTC senior consultant in microbiology and infectious diseases. Over the last two years, Navin reached expert levels in portable laboratory construction design, oversight of production and final delivery, representing the PPTC internationally as an authority in contract management and shipping container laboratory systems. With enormous regret the PPTC farewells Navin after 10 years of exceptional service to the Pacific and its people, and he will always be remembered for the enormous contribution that he has made to the quality of Pacific laboratory diagnostic services and the wellbeing of the communities they serve.
